


Capital Calligraphers is hosting the 28th annual All Oregon Calligraphers Conference (AOCC) at Western Oregon University in Monmouth on Saturday, October 24, 2009.

The conference will include a morning keynote speech, lunch, and an afternoon class. During breaks, attendees can shop for calligraphic and other art supplies, art by local artists, or visit with the keynote speaker to find out more about her work and working process.

Participants can select one of seven afternoon classes when they register for the conference. Classes are filled on a first-come, first-serve basis.

- Lori Festa will teach fracturing letters to create unique calligraphic design using pencils.
- Princti Flug will teach beginning pointed brush calligraphy.
- Portland artist Colle en Cavin will teach Neuland, a modern calligraphy alphabet.
- Forest Grove artist Patty Grass will teach bookmaking, working with students to create woven accordion fold books with flat piano hinges.
- · Ken O'Connell will teach drawing and sketching with colors.
- . Bill Blumberg and Joel Montgomery will teach the old craft of carved letters and designs in wood and stone.
- Lisa Taylor or Christy Wood from Stampin' Cat Studio in Salem will teach Wild Vines card making.

The conference keynote speaker is Laurie Doctor. She is an award-winning calligrapher, painter, and teacher living in Kentucky. "Laurie is a popular teacher at the international calligraphy conference - her class offerings fill quickly there," explain AOCC planning committee chairs Laura Drager and Carol Baumann. "We are so fortunate to have her coming to Oregon."

Laurie Doctor's keynote speech is titled "Time and Night." Laurie has become fascinated with the ability to lose ourselves in an activity, an ability we all enjoyed as children. She calls it "deep time" and her keynote will focus on how artists can access deep time. The talk will be illustrated with slides of her own work.

Laurie Doctor will also present one-day and two-day workshops during the week of the conference.

The October 24 conference begins with registration at 8:15 a.m. and closes at 4:00 pm. Conference registration includes lunch and all the day's activities. Lyn Graybeal's Artist Statement



The "Artist in me" made its first debut in my first year of school. Although I don't remember any of my particular works of art from that time, my first grade teacher left her testimony on my report card: "I enjoy Lyn's art work." "Lyn does very unique art." As I grew up, I spent time with my dad while my mom was at work. When my mom returned home, she would find the story of my evening with dad on the refrigerator, in the form of a child's art. As I grew older, I left art in the background of my life until college. Since I was required to take an art course, I choose Calligraphy. While studying under Judy Hoiness, in Bend Oregon, the "Artist in me" that budded in first grade grew and reached for the sun Judy inspired my love for art. She brought out in me creativity through reflection, analysis, and imagination; the skills necessary for its expression.

Although I'm flexible and somewhat unpredictable, and I'd rather not feel committed to a certain style, my greatest love is calligraphy. I generally like to work in abstract form, using various textures and bright, bold colors. As a scribe, I use calligraphy to embellish the thought behind the art.

One of the greatest rewards, for me, has been the combination of art and God's word. I love to express the precepts of the Bible through calligraphy and various forms of art. There are many avenues through which thoughts, ideas, concepts, feelings and emotions can be expressed. But for me, there is no higher form of expression than the Calligrapher's pen and ink. And there is no greater reward than teaching artistic expression to help others find the "Artist in them."



Street in downtown Salem.




## Programs

September: Fractured letters with Lori Festa (see photo below for example!) Please bring: pencil, eraser, soft graphite pencil or ebony pencil or colored pencils; pad of drawing paper; 12" ruler; reference images (florals, geometric shapes, etc.)

October: Chinese Painting and Calligraphy with Lee Bush Please bring drawing paper, pencil, ink and brush(es); Pentel Colorbrush will work well

November: Nature Printing- Diane Hutt and Penny White. You can decorate a card, envelopes or even a sheet of wrapping paper with this craft. Please bring leaves with interesting shapes and veining which you have pressed for at least a coup le of weeks; the leaves need to be flat and dry. You can print with rubber stamp pads, watercolor or gouache. Bring paper to print on, plenty of scrap paper which you will use as a surface to paint on and also to press and smooth the painted leaves; stamp pads or paints/palette/wide (1/2" to 1") brushes, a water jar and some paper towels.


