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








Chinese Calligraphy with Lee Bush

Lee Bush presented a great Chinese calligraphy program at our October Capital Calligraphers meeting, so we asked her to come back for some small workshops! She gave one in November and a second in January.

Lee grew up in Malaysia and learned Chinese calligraphy there. There are several different styles of Chinese calligraphy, and she taught us the "kai-shu" style. We practiced several of the basic strokes that make up the characters, and also practiced a few characters, including spring, summer, fall, and winter.

The characters should take up a square. Practice sheets show each character written within a square, and it's a good idea to draw squares on your paper for practicing or fold your paper into squares. You can also purchase a special sheet of practice paper that you can write on with water – the paper has squares printed on it for good practice! We also found it helpful to overlayour practice paper directly over the characters and trace them.


Near the end of the second workshop, Lee also showed us some basic Chinese painting. She created some lovely chrysanthemum and bamboo paintings that would be a great addition to calligraphic works with either English letters or Chinese characters.

Painting techniques with Robin Humelbaugh

Robin Humelbaugh returned to our guild meeting in February to present another fun painting program. This time, she taught us some techniques with interference and iridescent paints, and also showed us how to paint a wild rose.

For the first project, Robin gave us each a small piece of colored matte board. She explained that you can spread paint over the matte board, then use any one of a variety of tools to create patterns in the paint. Some of her favorite paints for this technique include Golden iridescents, Golden interference violet, and Behr premium pearlescent gold (Behr is available at Home Depot). You must create patterns in the paint very quickly, because it dries quickly, and also soak your brush in water quickly after painting so the paint doesn't dry in your brush.

Robin also showed us some examples where she created shapes with gesso on matte board, let the gesso dry, and then painted over the gesso. You may cover the shape either partially or completely with absorbent ground, which prepares the surface for watercolor, then paint over the shape.

For the second project, Robin first showed us how to sketch a wild rose. Draw a somewhat circular center, then create triangle shapes extending from the center for the petals. Make some of the petals folded over on each other. Wet the interior of a petal or leaf with a brush, then add a strong watercolor along one edge of the shape. The color will bleed into the interior of the shape. After you're done, be sure to let the paint dry overnight before you continue painting adjacent petals or leaves.

A couple of tips: you can add a tiny bit of yellow to the petal folds. Also, Graham paints are a great deal and good for this kind of project.



Programs

March 4 - Sgraffito with Nancy Orr. We'll be doing a waxed paper resist technique using watercolors. The samples we make will be suitable for applying to cards, but the technique can be used on larger calligraphic items.

Supplies: Watercolors (a couple colors & small pallet) or a few watercolor pencils; Water container; Small wash brush; Stylus (if you have one) or a ball point pen. Optional: A few metallic, gel or micron pens.

April 1 - Image transfer with Chris Anderson. You can add a bit of color and design to your calligraphy pieces by transferring pictures to your writing. I know that we were originally planning to do acetone transfers, but acetone is fairly toxic. I have discovered some other techniques that are a bit more user friendly. Most take some work and waiting time. For supplies, I would suggest you bring the following magazine pictures, inkjet pictures, hot press watercolor paper, a bone folder, small spray bottle with water, paint brush, scissors, paper towels. We can share items. I will choose some techniques to share with you.

May 6 - Plant and White Elephant Sale. Bring plants and calligraphy supplies that you'd like to sell. Proceeds help raise money for the guild!
