Class: Ornate Pictorial Flourishing with Pat Brasch

AOCC 2011, Sweet Home, Oregon

Class: "The space between two flowers is a flower" with Prindi Flug

We looked at letters as design elements. The white space is as important as the black space. There's something creative between two elements. Our first exercise was to think of our favorite alphabet and favorite letter. With 5mm pens (C-2 or Parallel or any other), we played with letters on bond paper. My examples were done with a 3.8 mm parallel pen with walnut ink. The copies may not be as black because of the ink.

Example 1. Writing on tracing paper over the sample on bond paper, we made designs with the letters moving the tracing paper around to see how different designs would look, then writing. Another suggestion was to outline the letter for your designs.


Example 2. Again writing on tracing paper, I outlined the design on #1 moving it down to repeat and overlap. I was using walnut ink on the inner letters. Shading/stippling was added.

Example 3. Next we were to think of a 3-4 letter word and make a design with it.

Example 4. I tried this design scrunching the word together and overlapping it a little.

We stopped frequently and walked around the room to see what others were doing. All were different and amazing. Prindi brought a class project book printed from a former class she taught. Their work was stunning with many great ideas.

This is definitely easy and addictive once you get started thinking of possibilities, and with 26 letters there is an infinite number of possibilities! I made an envelope using this technique for the recipient's name. Turned out great. Thanks for a fun afternoon, Prindi!



CC Workshop: Flat Brush Artistry with Marilyn Reaves

Choosing a brush: Want a brush that tapers on the end and springs back into shape. We were working with flat brushes so edge chiseled.

Gouache: Marilyn likes to work with gouache in her brush because it has body. She recommended the Graham brand since it doesn't get hard in the tube. How to prepare: put a dollop of color in a container, add water and mix so it is like heavy cream. Also have a spray mister handy to keep the gouache moist. She supplied a card for palleting – scrap of textured (so not slippery) mat board works. Put some color on brush and pallet (shape the brush by wiping back and forth on the mat board) to get a flat even edge on brush.

Watercolor: It has a lighter coverage and not as much body. Marilyn buys an empty palette that can be closed and puts in water colors she likes instead of buying a paint set with colors she may not use.

Holding the brush: It is okay to hold the brush like a pen but an almost upright angle is better. Using two fingers is another method allowing you to twist and twirl the brush. If your piece is large – stand while lettering. If a wall is your working space, sit in a chair.

Paper: Textured paper is best. If paper is slick it is harder to control the brush.

Tips: Using a brush is similar to a pen. Pen height, slant, lines all the same. Using more than one color on brush is easy by dipping pen in color then one side of brush into a different color.

Another trick is to take a small brush and “paint” series of colors on brush. Can spritz with water to get another stroke or two before repeating “painting”. To change color, simply swish brush in water. Dab on cloth, dip in next color. Not necessary to thoroughly clean or to use a different brush. If using more than one color simply use a bigger piece of mat board so have room to pallet more colors. If a hair pulls away from the brush pull out with tweezers. Colored pencils can be used to highlight gouache after it has dried. “Pump up” color by lightly working colored pencil in letter and blend so it isn't obvious. This gives more “umph” and builds up color. These are not water color pencils but the ones used for sketching.

Cloth: working on cloth is great, very forgiving. Go slower so bristles keep up with the lettering. Marilyn uses cloth for lettering wall hangings. Cotton muslin works well. Just tape it down and write. Can wash first to rid the cloth of sizing. Use a fabric marker to make lines. It simply brushes off.

Images: The broad brush can be used to draw images. This really adds to the lettering. See example.

WAYS TO ACCESS LIBRARY COLLECTION

1. Check Capital Calligraphers' website at www.capitalcalligraphers.org and click on LIBRARY. The titles are listed alphabetically under the headings BOOKS, CDS, DVDS, MAGAZINES & PERIODICALS, and VIDEOS.
2. Now, members can physically peruse the library collection at Bill's after making prior arrangements with Bill to schedule time and day via email: jb30y@hotmail.com (emailing is always best) or phoning: (503) 269-6758.
3. You can also email Bill to request a library item from the website list. He will reply to your request and bring it to the next Guild meeting. (when possible)
4. Bill has also volunteered to bring a selection of Library materials to each Guild meeting for check-out.

PROCEDURES FOR CHECKING OUT LIBRARY ITEMS

1. Find the card at the back of library item.
2. Sign and date the DUE DATE for the MONTH/YEAR of our next Guild meeting. Give the card to Bill if at Bill's or to Sylvia if at the meeting.

PROCEDURES FOR RETURNING OR RENEWING LIBRARY ITEMS

1. Return your checked out item to the RETURN BOX or to Sylvia at the Guild meeting when it's due.
2. Call or email Sylvia to renew library items for one month at a time as long as another member has not requested it. (limit of 3 months total). See phone number and email address above.

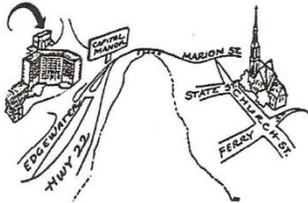
PROCEDURES FOR OVERDUE LIBRARY ITEMS
