

Practice, Practice, Practice

Editor's interview with Lori Festa Photography by Lori Festa

Lori has served as our past president, newsletter editor, and Summer Serendipity host for several years. She came to us from Albuquerque, New Mexico where she was very active in the Escribiente Calligraphy Society and before that in the New Haven Calligraphers Guild. She teaches digital and visual art at North Salem High School. We love her exuberance for art!

Were you interested in lettering as a child? What led you to study calligraphy?

In third grade we learned cursive writing. I must have been really good because I remember my teacher, Mrs. Carlson, had me finish a poem for another student for parent night. In high school, I made some handmade paper and my art teacher gave me a calligraphy pen to letter on it adding to my ink drawing. I didn't know what I was doing but it sparked my curiosity to learn more about calligraphy.



Are there artists who have been particularly influential to you through the years?

My art teachers from grammar school through high school influenced me as I learned different techniques in art. My college years at Paier College of Art opened my eyes to a wide variety of styles and techniques. I even took a typography class where we hand lettered different types styles and I can still hear his voice say, "you are one pencil stroke off".

For influential artists I look at the work of Diego Velazquez, Gustav Klimt, Eduard Manet, and Leonardo DaVinci... all game changers in the art world. I admire their approach to taking on challenges and going outside of what was



acceptable in their day.

For influences in calligraphy, I start with Pamela LaRegina who was my teacher for 2 years. She pushed me to be my best and introduced me to the bigger world of calligraphy. I love the calligraphic works of Donald Jackson, Charles Pierce, Jane Dill, Loredana Zega, Julian Waters, and Carl Rohrs, all of whom I have met &/or taken a class with.

A few other mentions for influences, my dear friend Gaye Roth, who I worked with as a graphic designer. She pushed me beyond my comfort zone and made me a better designer. Bill Kemp and Petrita Alcon were my calligraphy partners in Albuquerque who collaborated with me and inspired me in different calligraphy hands.

Is there a favorite project or type of projects you enjoy working on? What is your favorite lettering style?

Mixed media is my favorite style of lettering. Since I have a painting background, I enjoy working with acrylics and flat brush, then adding different mediums that enhance my work. My favorite lettering style is a modified pen manipulated Italics. I love adding my own twist to the letters.

Do you have an "aha" moment when working?

I'm not sure if I have an "aha" but I have a little story about what a friend observed while I'm working. She said most people sketch out, plan, create a rough draft, and rework their idea for a long time but you do something different. You stand and stare at the paper looking at it and imagining what is going to be on the paper before you pick up a tool, then you go for it! I had never thought about the way I work but I guess I do like to

envision my pieces in my head before I start.





Describe your process for creating a piece. Depending on the project, and before I envision what I want to do, I often look around at my books or online and see if there is anything that inspires me. I gather different decorative papers,

pick out my palette of warm colors or cool colors, decide on which lettering tool will be best suited for my vision, and then I go for it! Okay, I do thumbnail sketches when it is a more precise design, but if it is not and I have a lot of freedom. Basically, it's either thumbnails or brain sketches.

Do you ever experience artist's block? What helps you feel inspired during those moments?

I'm often a procrastinator and I work best under deadlines. Sometimes I stay up late at night and do my best work. If I'm working on a painting, I need to finish it so I'll do an all-nighter. If I'm working on a calligraphy piece or graphic design piece, I will stew the design in my brain until I see what I want. Others may think I'm not doing anything but I'm composing the design in my mind. I'll look at other people's work that catch my eye, then I do my "stare" envisioning.

I'm often doodling while I'm watching tv or sitting in a meeting, then take those doodles and use them for a larger piece.

Do you have other artistic interests?

I've mentioned above that I enjoy mixed media painting, portraiture in oils, acrylics, and pastels, and when traveling, I bring watercolors and try to get a painting in. When I go to the beach, I locate a found object that I can use as a tool and I letter in the sand. I call it Sand Script. Other materials I like to work with are metals and add patinas to them to make jewelry or add it to artwork. Honestly, I get bored easily so I like to try different mediums. Photography is another art form that I work with.

Is there a mantra you live by?

My mantra is: Practice, practice, practice. Sketch, sketch, sketch ... build up that muscle memory.



Share some tips for successful lettering projects.

Use the Elements of Art, Principles of Design, and Composition Rules on all pieces. Practice, practice, practice, and accept feedback. Take a class from an experienced or professional teacher.

Is there an artist from a past era you would have liked to have lunch with?

There are many artists that I would enjoy having lunch with but I think Georgia O'Keefe would be interesting to pick her brains because she worked in an era where women were not well known for their artistic value. I would also like to have lunch with one of my former teachers from Art School. Jean Day Zallinger was a book illustrator who inspired me as a young college student. She was blunt and shared what it was like in the real world as a female artist. Times have changed but it was women like her who paved the way for us.



How have your travels informed/aided your art?

I spent 10 weeks backpacking through Europe traveling around by train. The museums and architecture were aweinspiring. While at the Louve, I sat on a bench facing the Mona Lisa and fell asleep. A security guard had to wake me up. The Mona Lisa was so comforting, she let me sleep.

Europe also had a lot of calligraphy on the exterior of buildings, especially in Switzerland and Germany. Italy shared the statue of David with me (or at least I thought so), and its intricate doors enhancing the beautiful architecture. Paris made me fall in love with graffiti and what a powerful statement it can be.

Trips to Grand Cayman and Hawaii inspired my love for painting tropical flowers. Japanese art came into my life when I was in college and working in Japanese restaurants. They had beautiful artwork on the walls and when I finally visited Japan, I got to see even more inspiring works of art.

Growing up a train ride from New York/New Haven (Yale University) museums/galleries and Yale was something that I

did not take for granted. I spent a lot of time looking at art and I thank my mother for encouraging us to explore all forms of art growing up. With 6 siblings, I had to find my own place in my family and art was my forte (and as a 4-year varsity softball pitcher). We all need to find our place in this world.

What legacy do you want to leave?

I hope I have inspired a generation of young calligraphers to continue on creating lettering as an art form. Educating people about how important lettering is in graphic design, messaging/branding, and any visual art is sometimes not understood. Personally, once I started to study calligraphy, my other art work improved.


